- Select menu item:

- Click the **Select** button on the Left side.
- At the bottom of the screen, click on Upload images into the Competition.
- Then click on the button Select which will open a window on your computer to select images.
- Click on Save Images

### Calls for Entry: How to Expand Your Photo Practice and Photo Community

Many amateur photographers share their work in small, familiar networks. One helpful way to challenge and expand your photo practice is through participating in calls for entry. These exhibition contests offer excellent opportunities to hone your work around a certain theme, create coherent artist statements, develop a professional -looking online portfolio, and have your work considered in a larger photographic context. In this presentation, we'll explore useful ways to prepare for calls for entry and show how this preparation can serve your photo practice beyond specific contests, and even expand your photo community in local and digital networks.



## Three Basics for Good Landscapes

Taking beautiful landscape photographs requires luck sometimes to be at the right place at the right time. Landscape photography without planning and close attention to detail, is likely to be disappointing. The images your eyes see are not necessarily those the camera records. There are three basic elements for making successful scenic pictures: 1) Light; 2) composition; 3) Depth.

The best light to photograph a landscape is always side light. The angle of the light can emphasize texture. The foreground should have some object with definite surface. It is extremely important to have foreground and background in focus.

Low angle pictures work best with wider lenses around the 18mm range. It is important to ensure that the camera is mounted on a tripod and leveled.

Composition amounts to pleasing arrangements of objects, mass, lines and contrast or colors to form a harmonious whole. The knowledge of the Rule of Thirds will help.

Most effective landscapes also convey a sense of depth. One of the oldest and simplest aids in making good landscape composition is to use invisible lines so the eye should move inside the picture observing its content. Those lines should never go out of the picture.

#### Please keep the judging criteria in mind:

Impact and Viewer Interest — "Wow" factor is the nebulous quality where an image "pops". This subjective aspect of judging should not preempt the technical or composition aspects of an image.

**Composition** — Good composition is a pleasing arrangement of the elements in an image. There are many guidelines for good composition that judges may consider.

**Technical Quality** — This includes sharpness, focus, color, tonal scale, contrast, appropriate depth of field and other qualities. Consideration is also given for the effect the photographer was trying to achieve such as high key, multiple exposure, selective focus, etc.

**Monthly Themes** — The subject matter should be related in some manner to the theme. While there are no formal "deductions" or penalties, judges may reduce their overall score if they feel the image does not align with monthly theme. With that said, creative interpretation is encouraged.

## Loveland Photographic Society Member Survey

In March we conducted a brief membership survey. The LPS Board wanted to know what we are doing well as a club and also what we might do to improve. Sixty-five members responded to the 10-item questionnaire. The Board is reviewing the detailed survey results and will keep you informed of any actions we take to address the great suggestions you offered. For now, here is a quick summary of the survey results.

Sixty-two percent of you that responded have been members longer than three years.

You selected the third Monday photo review as the most frequently utilized service/activity in which you participated (not including monthly meetings). It was also the activity that garnered the most comments. Participants found the feedback from third Monday to be very helpful. Field trips were the second most frequently selected service/activity. You also requested more frequent field trip opportunities and had some great ideas for places to visit.

You listed a wealth of ideas for monthly topics and for possible workshops. Photo editing using Lightroom and Photoshop led the list. Also of interest were presentations or workshops on lighting, macro photography, night photography, street photography, and wildlife and landscape work. There was also interest in photo storage, organization and workflow. Many other great ideas were offered – over 40 unique suggestions!

An overwhelming number of your comments on the monthly photo competition addressed the

desire to have more feedback on the photos and a better understanding of the judging process. You offered some very thoughtful suggestions for improving the competition experience that definitely warrant exploration.

Most of you who responded read the Newsletter regularly, found it helpful, and had some great ideas for future articles. A number of you also suggested that the Newsletter include member profiles, tips for local photo sites, and photo examples that demonstrate a particular technique.

The last few questions on the survey asked about our monthly meetings, our level of success at fulfilling the mission of our organization and other thoughts you wanted to share. Ninety-seven percent of you said you would recommend LPS to other photographers, but there are areas that you'd like to see us work on. There were three general improvement themes that emerged in your comments. We need to be better at welcoming and integrating new members to LPS. We need to provide more opportunities for sharing knowledge and skills in smaller groups. We need to continue to "up our game" in providing high quality learning experiences for our members. You shared many ideas for how we might meet these needs.

The LPS Board thanks you for your input. You have given us plenty to work on, and much to celebrate!

Finally, so many of you mentioned how much you appreciate the venue provided by Group Publishing and the tasty offerings we now have before each meeting. A special thanks goes out to Group Publishing!
