oveland photographer and first generation Italian-American, Peter Spagnuolo grew up in Queens, New York City and has lived a varied life.

Although his education is in advertising and art design from the State University of New York, he worked as a certified aircraft mechanic starting with Pan American Airlines. After the airline went bankrupt, Spagnuolo's 32-year career ended.

Now retired, Spagnuolo moved to Loveland to be near his family and has made photography his primary activity.

He got his first camera in his teens, a twin lens reflex that took 120 film. He also fell in love with black-and-white photography as a means of expressing his art. He learned about developing and printing, eventually leading to teaching classes.

Upon moving to Loveland, he joined the Loveland Photographic Society and progressed to become an advanced photographer.

Although he has sold some of his images, his focus is on his art and in entering contests. Recently, he has taken instruction from David Black on painting with light. This has opened up new possibilities.

Spagnuolo is an award-winning photographer, known for his beautiful landscapes and vignettes of people.

He was recently awarded "Best of Show" at the 2013 annual Artist Association of Northern Colorado. His photographs have been exhibited at the University of Northern Colorado and currently at galleries in Fort Collins and Greeley.

At the Center for Fine Art Photography in Fort Collins (400 N. College Ave.), he will be part of a juried show that runs from July 25 through Aug. 29. His entry is

one of 52 images at the show. It depicts a woman sitting at a table in Rome with a street musician trying to impress her. It is apparent that she could not care less.

As for his travels, Spagnuolo says, "...visiting Italy has taught me to know that life in Italy and life in America are very different ... Traditionally, Italians have an easy going and positive outlook on how to go about daily life. Italians live la vita bella (the beautiful life ..."

As for those wanting to become professional fine art photographers, Spagnuolo suggests, "Keep the day job even though photography may be your first love. The more you shoot, the luckier you get!"

The View From The Hill

session with three members (thanks Kristi, Lynne, and Shannon) that was originally billed as moving from basic to intermediate photography. We started out discussing some general ideas around composition and critique of some images they had. However, the discussions quickly turned into Adobe Lightroom instruction and how to use the tool to take a good image and turn it into a really nice image for display or competition. It's not that they were taking poor images. They all were, in fact, taking some really nice pictures. What was lacking was impact and how to use the post processing tools to bring out the best in the images

I see this a lot in images posted on various websites, Facebook, etc. Pictures that have potential, but don't quite make it because the photographer didn't take the time to do the most basic of post processing. The two things that bug me the most are cropping and color corrections.

The 35mm frame (or 4x5 or 8x10 or whatever your favorite format) doesn't fit every situation. In fact, whatever format you are using rarely fits any situation. Cropping is almost always required to improve the composition and impact of the image. Take, for example, the iconic image of Igor Stravinsky taken by Arnold Newman (http://www.arnoldnewmanarchive.com/media-gallery/detail/58/316). Newman was one of the 20th century's best photojournalists, but this photograph was heavily cropped to give the result that the world knows as one of the great photographic portraits.

Color correction is another fatal flaw that I see in many photographs. Many times a photographer will take a picture of something, like people or wildlife, outside in the shade, but not correct the color. The result is that the image has a disturbing (to me) blue cast that detracts from the impact of the photograph.

A way to correct this is to use a gray card, then correct for color in your favorite software. You have to be a little careful here, though. For those of us who grew up photographically with film, we were taught that the infamous Kodak Gray Card was also color correct. That, unfortunately, was not correct. That card was 18% reflectivity, but not "gray". It gave us the correct exposure, but didn't represent "gray" in the sense of red, green, and blue having exactly the same values.

What we need today is something that's true neutral gray, that is, red, green, and blue have exactly the same values. It could be totally black, totally white, or something in between. Xrite's Color Checker Passport and several other tools are perfect for this. All of Adobe's products can use this to correct color instantly.

Of course, "correct" color may not be right for the artistic feeling you are looking for, but it's at least a good starting point. Another process that may take you astray is using the white balance in your camera. For example, if I use the flash setting on my Nikon D800, I find that the result is too green for my taste. So, I have a Lightroom preset that I've determined to work for me to correct flash exposures.

So, if you want to move your photography to the next level, you have to start thinking about some of these things. What comes directly out of the camera is rarely going to be the best you can produce. Learn to use some basic software tools to enhance your images and improve your results and, if you enter competitions, improve your chances to get a ribbon.
